Gr 8 Up. College student Mei would love to major in dance, but her Taiwanese parents have different ideas. This plan is complicated by the fact that Mei actually has a crippling fear of germs, has developed a crush on a Japanese-American classmate, and is trying to reconnect with her beloved older brother, who has recently been disowned by their parents.

Let’s Talk About Love

Gr 9 Up. “Alice is secretly asexual, and that’s the least important thing about her. She’s a college student, has a great job, amazing friends, and is fine being single—nope, that’s a lie. Alice wants rom-com-grade romance: feels, cuddling, kissing, and swoons galore—as long as it doesn’t lead to having sex. When her last relationship ends, Alice swears off relationships for good. Stick a fork in her, she’s done. Everyone Alice tries to date is so sure love and sex have to go together, and there doesn’t seem to be any way to convince them otherwise. But when Alice meets Takumi, who she can’t stop thinking about, she doesn’t know what to do. If Alice tells him the truth, it can only end in heartache. Leviathan, David***Boy Meets Boy***

Gr 7 Up. This happy-go-quirky tale chronicles one academic year at a very non-conventional high school, where the quarterback is also the homecoming queen, the cheerleaders ride Harleys, and being straight-out gay is perfectly okay. But even in this oasis of tolerance, Paul still has normal teenage problems. Although he's dating Noah, a quiet, artistic newcomer, he realizes he might still have feelings for his ex, Kyle. This, his best female friend, Joni, starts dating not-so-nice-guy Chuck, and begins drifting away from their close-knit circle of friends. What's a boy to do? A funny, touching story about self-acceptance and the love our friend and family give us, despite the stupid mistakes we make.

Menon, Sandhya***When Dimple Met Rishi***

Gr 7 Up. Rishi and Dimple's very traditional East Indian parents are conspiring to arrange their children's future marriage. Obedient son Rishi knows this and looks forward to meeting his future bride, but modern feminist Dimple hasn't got a clue—until she and Rishi are assigned to be partners during a summer coding camp and Rishi accidentally blurts out the news. Horrified, Dimple declares she wants nothing to do with her parents' plans—but the more she gets to know Rishi, the more she realizes that she really, really likes him. Can she overlook the awkwardness of their initial meeting, or is their relationship doomed from the start?
